# September 2023

### Positive Youth Development Oneida County 4-H

### Anne Williams, 4-H Educator

- Provided leadership for the Oneida County 4-H Lego
  Robotics "Explorers" Club for youth ages 7-10. The goal
  of this effort is for youth to discover a real-world
  challenge and opportunity, talk about their hobbies
  and/or interests, think about how they use
  art/creativity in their hobbies and/or interests, and
  share their ideas with each other.
- Ongoing support and leadership for the Oneida County 4-H Leaders' Association, a group comprised of youth and adult 4-H volunteers. The goal of this effort is for members to conduct county-level 4-H programs with youth, raise funds, manage the budget to support 4-H programming, coordinate county-level recognition for youth and adults, represent 4-H to the community, and to advocate for 4-H.

- A leadership workshop for Oneida County 4-H members, grades 5 and up, where youth participated in hands-on, leadership-based, activities and became familiar with evidence-based youth development curriculum while choosing a 4-H Cloverbud program topic they would like to help lead. The goal of this effort is for youth to learn more about themselves, how they can use their own characteristics to work with others, identify strengths when leading and working with others, and develop life skills through active engagement in leadership.
- Ongoing guidance and support for an Oneida County 4-H Youth Leader, helping this individual plan to lead a 4-H program series for elementary-aged youth that incorporates activities geared toward developing public speaking, leadership, and building confidence.

Through this work, this individual will gain life skills related to project management, planning, and working with the community.

- Ongoing planning for an Oneida County 4-H LEGO Robotics program for youth ages 7-10 in Rhinelander. The goal of this effort is to provide an opportunity for youth to explore their sparks (interests) in science, technology, engineering, art, and math, while being introduced to the 4-H program.
- A gathering of the Northwoods Explorers 4-H Club, where youth led club business, recreation, and participated in a hands-on activity where they learned about 4-H opportunities for the 2023-2024 4-H year. In addition, a club member gave a demonstration on how to make a healthy snack. The goal of this effort was for youth to gain a sense of belonging in a safe, supported, and welcoming environment, and consider club leadership opportunities.

### Positive Youth Development

### Sharon Krause, Community Youth Development Educator

- Presented to Rural Virtual Academy high school students, where I and another Teen Court Coordinator
  gave an overview of the teen court system, and qualities needed to serve as a teen court panelist. The
  presentation was shared to raise awareness of restorative justice and opportunities for youth to serve
  their communities by possibly joining a teen court program.
- Led a staff training for employees at New Horizons Family Services in Rhinelander, WI. A tribal partner and I taught the history of Lac du Flambeau, tribal sovereignty, and the boarding school era in order to increase the staff's effectiveness as they serve tribal youth and families. New Horizons partners with Oneida and Vilas County Social Services Departments by offering parenting classes, substance use mitigation, coping skills, respite care for parents of disabled children, Comprehensive Community Service caseworkers, mentors for youth, youth curricula like Botvin Life Skills, and other services.

Program that incorporates activities geared toward public speaking, leadership, and building confidence. Through this work, the individual will gain life skills related to project management, planning, and working with the community.
- Continued leadership for Oneida County 4-H LEGO Robotics "Explorers" Club where youth ages 7-10 built a LEGO model from a lesson and explored the use of lights and sensors. The goal of this effort was for youth to identify how lights and sounds are used to make an exhibit interactive, discover a real-world challenge and opportunity, develop life skills of teamwork, communication, decision-making, and critical thinking, discuss what inclusion is, and communicate their ideas with others.
- Leadership for Oneida County 4-H LEGO Robotics "Explorers" Club where youth ages 7-10 created a LEGO model from the lesson and explored motor coding blocks. The goal of this effort is for youth to discover a
  - real-world challenge and opportunity, learn basic coding skills, develop life skills of teamwork, communication, decision-making, and critical thinking, discuss what inclusion is, and communicate their ideas with others.
- Leadership for the Oneida County 4-H "Explorers" Lego Robotics club for youth ages 7-10 where they added music concert pieces to the basic stage they previously built. The goal of this effort is for youth to discover a real-world challenge and opportunity,

  built a basic stage and mini figures. The goal of this effort is for youth to discover a real-world
  challenge and opportunity, discuss what teamwork is, explore different jobs in the arts and tools or
  objects used, and communicate what they did and learned with each other.
- Leadership for the Northwoods Explorers 4-H Club for youth ages 5-12 and their families, where youth
  participated in club officer elections and club goals, as well as Halloween-themed activities. The goal of
  this effort is to increase member involvement, for youth members to learn skills needed to become
  effective youth leaders, and to encourage youth to apply leadership skills to other settings and become
  effective citizens.
- Planning and support for an Oneida County 4-H volunteer to lead a "Learn to Sew" 4-H program based in Minocqua. The goal of this effort is for youth to recognize basic sewing machine parts and how to use a sewing machine, and for the adult volunteer to gain skills in teaching quality 4-H positive youth development programs and developing communication skills.
- Support for the Oneida County 4-H Leaders'
   Association to host the 2023 Oneida County
   4-H Welcome & Recognition Event where 4-H
   members, volunteers, families, and county
   partners and guests were welcomed and
   received recognition. The goal of this event is
   to help youth become more capable and

### Positive Youth Development

## Sharon Krause, Community Youth Development Educator

- A free training in Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR) at Minocqua Library, where the general public was invited in order to increase the number of people trained in suicide prevention.
- Participated in a coalition meeting held by Oneida County's Health Department, where members of
  various agencies started collaborating on an application for a Drug-Free Community Grant in order to
  prevent underage drinking. The primary issues we will address are Stigma, Community Norms, and
  Lack of Treatment Providers. My role will be to educate youth about alcohol, reduce stigma about
  getting help, and include youth voice in decision-making.



## Oneida Sep/Oct 2023 Report

- Organized and provided leadership for an educational program at the Oneida County Courthouse,
  where Teen Court Panelists observed a civil jury trial. This was an opportunity for the young leaders to
  learn more about court proceedings and the impact of both traditional and social media on the courts.
  Along with observing the trial, discussions were had with the youth and space was provided for them
  to process and share.
- Met with the new principal of Lakeland Union High School, where we discussed the state of the school and Extension resources, in order to explore possible future collaborations.

### **FoodWise**

- Taught weekly lessons at Central Elementary School with a total of 22 lessons taught, reaching 104 1<sup>st</sup>, 3<sup>rd</sup>, and 5<sup>th</sup> graders (Allison Wilson).
- Attended the first Regional Food Pantry Network Meeting. Food pantry directors, organizers, and
  volunteers from multiple counties met at the Rhinelander Area Food Pantry. The meeting in October
  was the first of recurring quarterly meetings with surrounding food pantry leaders to learn and
  network with one another. Extension is helping provide leadership and structure for the network.
