## **Positive Youth Development Oneida County 4-H**

#### Anne Williams, 4-H Educator

- Facilitated a gathering of the Northwoods Explorers 4-H Club, where youth led club business, recreation, and education. The Northwoods Explorers 4-H Club places heavy emphasis on citizenship and leadership development, and helping youth explore sparks (interests). The goal of this effort was for youth to develop strong and supportive relationships with peers and caring adults in a safe, supported, and welcoming environment, and to be actively engaged in making group decisions while practicing life skills.
- Provided support and planning assistance to the adult 4-H volunteer leader of the Oneida County 4-H Junior Leaders group. An important role of the Oneida County 4-H Educator is to offer resources to assist 4-H volunteers to find success in their volunteer roles through offering quality Positive Youth Development programs. The Oneida County 4-H Educator provided support to the 4-H adult volunteer by arranging for facility space and offering additional information about the 4-H structure and essential elements. The goal of this group is for youth and teens to learn how to plan, organize, and lead various activities and projects. Doing so enhances their leadership abilities, engages them in community service projects (which helps them understand the importance of giving back and fosters a sense of civic responsibility), develops skills such as teamwork, problem-solving, and public speaking, and creates well-rounded individuals who are prepared to take on leadership roles in their communities and beyond.

The goal of this effort was for youth



to build positive relationships with each other, gain a sense of belonging, and learn concepts in science, technology, engineering, and math through fun, exciting hands-on learning.

- Facilitated a gathering of the Oneida County 4-H LEGO Robotics Challenge Club, where youth in grades 4-8
  participated in hands-on education, team building, and inquiry-based science learning with a positive youth
  development framework. The goals of this effort were for youth to build positive relationships with each other, gain
  a sense of belonging, and learn concepts in science, technology, engineering, and math through fun, exciting handson learning
- Coordinated and supported the Oneida County 4-H Lego Robotics Challenge team to participate in a FIRST Lego
  League regional competition for youth in grades 4-8. The goal of this effort was to provide youth from Oneida
  County an opportunity to meet other teams from across the state while participating in friendly competition,
  increase STEM interest and confidence, enhance their teamwork and problem solving skills, provide hands-on
  experience with programming and coding, which are essential skills in today's technology-driven world, and support

  industries throughout Wisconsin.

- Planned for, and supported, a new Oneida County 4-H adult volunteer as they prepared to chaperone two Oneida County 4-H members at the Wisconsin 4-H Fall Forum, a statewide 4-H event for youth in grades 7 and up and adult volunteers. The goal was for the volunteer and youth 4-H members to have a successful, positive experience and feel confident to bring back what they learned to their community.
- Facilitated planning efforts to bring the UW-Madison Wonders of Physics program to schools throughout Forest and Oneida counties. The goals of this effort were to expand access for students to view a UW-Madison-based STEM program and enhance science literacy by making physics accessible and fun, thereby promoting a better understanding of science in the community.
- Provided leadership at a 4-H Club Officer Training for the Northwoods Explorers 4-H Club, where youth leaders participated in hands-on leadership activities. The goal of this effort was to empower youth in the 4-H Club setting to take active leadership roles in their elected position, while enhancing life skill development such as leadership, decision making, problem solving and communication, as well as be better prepared to successfully navigate their officer position.

It's so much more than that! 4-Hers spend time setting goals, thinking strategically about how to improve what they are doing, and taking brain breaks when needed! Every time they meet, these future leaders are practicing essential skills such as time management, goal setting, cooperation, and how to have positive interactions with peers - and they may not even realize it!



These Oneida County 4-H members participated in 4-H Club Officer Training, designed to help new and returning officers understand their roles and responsibilities within the club. The training offered practice in building leadership skills and understanding the qualities of a good leader, fostering teamwork and trust, learning the basics of running a meeting effectively using parliamentary procedure, and practicing what they've learned in a simulated club meeting environment.

Students at Nativity School in Rhinelander were delighted when they saw air rings shoot out from a vortex cannon, as part of the Wonders of Physics Show led by Haddie McLean with UW-Madison's Department of Physics. Extension 4-H Educators from Florence, Forest, and Oneida County worked together to bring this show from Madison to schools in Florence, Forest, and Oneida Counties.

- Created a proposal information packet, which was distributed to Leadership Oneida County participants during the program's "Community Project Presentation Day," on behalf of the Rhinelander Performing Arts Center Planning Group. The goal of this effort was to satisfy a request from the planning group to write a project proposal and present it to Leadership Oneida County, so its participants can receive the additional research it needs to make better informed decisions on its vision to create a performing arts center in Rhinelander.
- Facilitated an event where 4-H members participating in the Oneida County 4-H Pen Pal program got to meet their senior citizen pen pals in person for the first time at a holiday gathering at Grace Lodge in Rhinelander. The program was a collaboration with the Oneida County Aging and Disability Resource Center and Grace Lodge. The goal of this effort was for 4-H youth to increase their compassion and understanding, develop their communication skills, and learn from a person of a different generation.

- Coordinated and provided support for the Oneida County 4-H Lego Robotics Challenge team to participate in a FIRST Lego League sectional competition for youth in grades 5-8. The goal of this effort was to provide youth from Oneida County an opportunity to meet other teams from across the state while participating in friendly competition; increase STEM interest and confidence; enhance teamwork and problem solving skills; provide hands-on experience with programming and coding; and support the development of social-emotional skills such as self-awareness, selfregulation, empathy, and responsibility.
- Provided leadership and support to members of the Oneida County 4-H Leaders' Association as they reflected on 4-H events and activities that have occurred, as well as discussed ways to conduct county-level 4-H programs with

youth, raise funds and manage a budget to support 4-H programs, and represent 4-H throughout the county. The goal of this effort was to provide a local forum for youth and adult volunteer leaders to discuss ideas and provide input to enhance 4-H Youth Development programs at the county level.

• Participated in planning with a prospective 4-H volunteer to start a 4-H Cloverbuds club for youth in grades K-2 to occur within the Northwoods Explorers 4-H Club. The goal of this effort was to provide an overview of the 4-H program, its mission, the impact it has on youth and the community, outline the Cloverbud 4-H volunteer leader role, training opportunities, overview of available resources, and answer questions.

## **Positive Youth Development**

# Sharon Krause, Community Youth Development Educator

- Leading preparations for a field trip to UW-Madison, where Raise Your Voice Club Members from Rhinelander and Lakeland Union High Schools will attend Badger Talk Lectures to learn more about mental health and to conduct an experiment about Seasonal Affective Disorder. They will also be planning events for Oneida County where their knowledge will be shared in order to increase youth resiliency within their communities.
- Innovated an effort to capture the effectiveness of Oneida County Teen Court by collecting data dating back to 2010 and having it organized into spreadsheets that will make it possible to analyze different outcomes, such as tracking recidivism as adults.

# **Health and Well Being**

## Terri Kolb, FoodWIse Coordinator

Provided backbone support for a health-focused coalition on mental health and suicide prevention, where
individuals and agencies come together to empower members of the community through education and sharing
resources. The goal of this effort was to increase community partnerships, capacity, and collaborative efforts to
support healthy choices regarding social and emotional well-being. The coalition is developing an emergency food
network of individuals and agencies, with a goal to identify the successes, conditions, and challenges related to
emergency food distribution locally. The coalition also identifies appropriate responses that can be used collectively.

## Allison Wilson, FoodWIse Educator

- Attended the Hodag Food Wagon Wrap-up Meeting. In the summer of 2024, The Hodag Food Wagon provided 1,441 food bags along with fresh vegetables and fruits in an 8-week period. The need increased from 825 food bags in 2023 to an additional 175 bags in 2024. The average value was \$15 per bag. This summer, FoodWIse focused efforts to provide samples and recipes for quick, healthy meals that adults and children could prepare together using the food provided in each bag.
- Attended the Oneida County Nutrition Coalition Meeting. The first meeting for the coalition was held in November bringing together many partners within Oneida County. Some of those partners included Social Services, School District of Rhinelander, WIC, Food Pantries, Children's Wisconsin, YMCA of the Northwoods, FoodWIse, and Marshfield Clinic. The coalition will be meeting quarterly to continue discussions on the best way

to utilize grant funds received from Marshfield Clinic. After the first meeting, a goal to collaborate in order to bring actionable initiatives to address the hunger and nutrition needs of Oneida County children and families was created.

- Renewed partnership with Oneida County WIC. When the pandemic hit there were no in-person services for quite a long time, which made it impossible to partner with WIC during that extended time period. At the beginning of December, FoodWIse joined WIC to facilitate an Open House to WIC eligible families in the Minocqua area. A healthy snack formed in the shape of Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer was offered to attendees.
- Completed 5-week programming at Pelican Elementary, where students in grades 1, 3, and 5 were taught a series of nutritional lessons. In total, this programming reached 113 students.

## Laurel Parins, Health & Wellbeing Educator

Significant program planning was done in the months of November & December. As a newer colleague, still working
through developing Plan of Work and assessing and prioritizing needs in Oneida County. Articles written for ADRC
Newsletter and continued work with MHLT's School Wellness Committee. Plans are underway for both in-service
education and ongoing education through e-newsletters in 2025.
